ABOUT THE ACTIVITY

The Blue Pool of Questions (Penny Candy Books) is an award-winning illustrated book for all ages. In the tale, a man asks so many big questions that his questions form a pool that grows to the size of an ocean. That pool strands the people who like “everyday answers” and have forgotten “what questions look like.” The man, however, cannot look away from his questions and chooses to dive into the pool and live deep in his own curiosity. The book encourages readers to:

*Ask more questions.
Throw them into the blue pool.
Be brave
Dive in.*

A companion activity could be used in:

- Elementary, middle school, or high school classroom
- School library as a read aloud and activity
- Public library as an event and/or ongoing display
- Community group to explore the “big questions” of a project or community change

The activity should inspire your readers (students, patrons, and/or community) to ask the big questions. Whether their questions are personal, philosophical, political, or seemingly impossible, the activity invites them simply **to ask**.

There are blue slips of paper provided in this kit (pages 12 & 13). If your readers’ questions are written on these blue slips and collected in a clear container, the “pool of questions” grows deeper and deeper with every question asked. This visual pays tribute to the story, but also demonstrates the power of a community coming together to exhibit curiosity. Explore more on page 7.

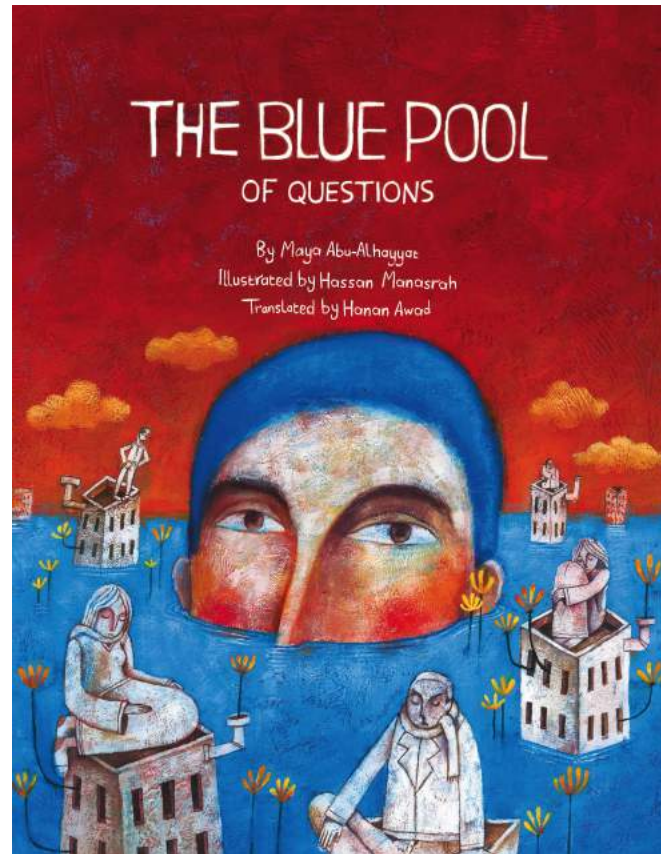

ABOUT THE CREATORS

Maya Abu-Alhayyat is an award-winning Palestinian novelist, poet, and children's book writer. She has published three collections of poetry, three novels, and several children's books. Her writing has been featured in international journals and magazines and has been translated into English, French, German, Swedish, and Korean. Since 2013 Maya has worked as the director of the Palestinian Writing Workshop in Birzeit, West Bank, Palestine. She lives in Jerusalem with her husband and children. Maya is the author of **The Blue Pool of Questions**.



Hassan Manasrah is a visual artist, illustrator, and comic creator. From 2008 to 2010, he worked as assistant art director for the animated cartoon series *Pink Panther & Pals*. Since 2010, he has illustrated 25 children books. In 2016, he won an Etisalat Award for best illustration for the Palestinian edition of this book. Hassan is the illustrator of **The Blue Pool of Questions**.

Hanan Awad, known to most as *Debwania*, is a Palestinian-American living in Edmond, Oklahoma. *Debwania* is an established street photographer. She received her undergraduate degree in Middle Eastern Studies from Rutgers University, a filmmaking certificate from New York Film Academy, where she also studied photography, and is completing her Masters in History at University of Central Oklahoma with a focus on Latin America and the Middle East. Hanan is the translator of **The Blue Pool of Questions**.

MAKING A BLUE POOL

There are two sheets in this kit that have blue slips ready for your readers' questions. One sheet (page 12) has the blue slips and instructions for the reader to add their question to the Blue Pool. Another sheet (page 13) provides a full sheet of blue slips for you to cut out in advance for engaging with a larger group.

To show your readers how asking questions can create a blue pool, try collecting the blue slips in a clear container. If you are setting up an ongoing display where readers will approach and add a question, the kit provides some signage (pages 14 and 15). The smaller sign was designed to fit into the lid of a particular plastic container that works well with this activity. That container is the "mDesign Kitchen Storage Container Box with Hinged Lid - 2-Quarts, Clear." When the lid of the 7.1" x 10.7" x 2.3" box is open and the smaller sign is affixed to the inside cover, it makes a wonderful display unit. The box can be bought at online retailers for about \$10.



CONNECTING TO THE LARGER POOL

Penny Candy Books is collecting questions from across the country and around the world. Consider having the questions in your Blue Pool join the growing international pool of questions at BluePoolofQuestions.com. Your community's privacy will be protected there. The form asks only for a first name, email, age (optional), and general location. All the questions can be linked to your email address and all that will be displayed to the public is the question, age (optional), and the questioner's general location.

If you share your community's questions on your social networks, consider sharing with the hashtag #BluePoolofQuestions.

Educators who have explored this book with students of all ages have found author and poet Naomi Shihab Nye to be correct. The “elliptical, allegorical story” (*Publishers Weekly*) respects the reader and invites readers to ask questions. Students are full of compelling questions. The classroom activity exhibits inquiry and shows that the big questions do not have a single answer.

You can prompt them to explore the “big questions” with some of your own such as:

What questions do you fall asleep thinking about?

What questions do your family or your teachers never seem to have an answer for?

What questions would you ask the most powerful people in this country? The world?

If you could ask the Earth a question, what would it be?

If you could ask an animal a question, which animal would it be and what would you ask?

If you could ask a question of anyone from history, who would you ask and what would you ask them?

If you could ask a question of anyone from the future, what would it be?

Alternatively, focus the questions on something your classroom is struggling with. For example, if there was a death in the school community, could you invite your students to throw their questions about the loss into the Blue Pool? If there is an incident of perceived injustice, could you ask your students to throw their questions about the injustice into the Blue Pool?

Current affairs lessons could also include a reading of and engagement with the Blue Pool. For example, is it a coincidence that author Maya Abu-Alhayyat lives in the Palestine territories, one of the most politically entangled regions of the world?

BLUE POOL IN THE LIBRARY

There is no better place to inspire and ask big questions than at the library.

Imagine using this book as a read aloud with children and/or adults. Patrons could be invited to ask questions on blue slips of paper to add to them to the Blue Pool (see Making a Blue Pool above). This could be done as a stand-alone event or in conjunction with a current affairs or community conversation.

Libraries could also display a non-circulating copy of the book with blue slips of paper and signage to invite patrons to add questions into the Blue Pool. Those questions could be open-ended individual reactions to the book or you could pose a question about the library, the community, or the world for your patrons to respond to.

When you accumulate the questions (see Making a Blue Pool above) in a clear container, it shows your patrons the power of their collective curiosity.

BLUE POOL IN YOUR COMMUNITY

While members of your community may want answers, the whole community could benefit by asking questions.

Imagine using this book as a read aloud with all ages. Community members could be invited to ask questions on blue slips of paper and then add them to the Blue Pool (see Making a Blue Pool above). This could be done as a stand-alone event or in conjunction with a larger ongoing community conversation about injustices, growth, connections, or another more specific topic.

Imagine working with your library, bookstore, or community center to display a copy of the book for citizens to read at their leisure. Blue slips of paper and signage could invite community members to add questions into the Blue Pool. Those questions could be open-ended individual reactions to the book or you could pose a question about a community issue at hand.

When you accumulate the questions (see Making a Blue Pool above) in a clear container, you show the community the power of their collective curiosity.
